Dear Parishioners:

In reflecting upon the past year, my heart overflows with gratitude for our parish community's many blessings over the course of its 70 year history and your unwavering support, love and dedication. Your willingness to share your time, talents and treasures enhances the vibrancy of our parish! This past year, 64 new families registered with our parish and 69 new students joined our religious education program. Numerous caring volunteers joined together to assist the needy through our many outreach programs.



The many contributions to our continuing campaign to fund parish capital projects allowed us to replace our school's dual air conditioning and heating systems; inspect and repair our fire and carbon monoxide detectors, smoke beam detectors and fire alarm pulls; replace portions of fencing around the field and add bollards to protect the fencing; upgrade the main church's sound system; replace projector lamps; and secure defibrillators. Although we did not reach our goal, more parishioners participated in the annual Cardinal's Appeal and the average gift per parishioner increased.

We held our first Lunar Festival, bid farewell to Fr. Raymond, welcomed Fr. Rocky, celebrated my 30 years of priesthood, hosted the Southern Westchester Regional Meeting for Youth Faith Formation and Religious Education Directors and Coordinators, hosted the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage and held Religious Education summer classes for the first time. We also conducted safety lockdown drills for our Religious Education students with the guidance of local law enforcement.

We enjoyed our annual Volunteers and New Parishioners Reception in February where we gave Light of the World awards to Tom Battistoni and Emilia Rodriguez, Ann and Peter (posthumous) Cervoni, Sylvia and Gregory (posthumous) DeSousa and Manny and Martha Neiro for their service to the parish over the years. We also honored Marina Cardillo, Kathy Cripps, Patti Gordon and Debra Lupardo with Salt of the Earth service awards. We welcomed Jim Bruni, Christina Colagrande, Anthony Fiorenza, James Koume, Billy Lacerenza, and Kelly Myers to the Parish Council. We bid farewell to retiring Parish Council members Katherine Berthod, Ryan Berthod, Jim Briggs, and Renee Latore. We look forward to their continuing participation in our parish.

The parish had an operating deficit of \$307,448 this past year that was funded from one-time bequests and donations, other extraordinary income, the renovation, repair and maintenance campaign, and \$49,915 from the parish's reserves. In the past, we have been able to fund operating deficits from the school rental, one-time donations and bequests and collection of pledges from our capital campaigns without utilizing reserves.

We are projecting an operational deficit of \$164,148 for the 2024-2025 fiscal year, notwithstanding a budgeted increase in offertory collections. It is not fiscally prudent to fund operating deficits from reserves, so we ask each parishioner to prayerfully consider making an increased financial commitment to our parish according to his/her means so we are able to continue the good works and spiritual community we have become.

Your continuing commitment to the Church of St. Pius inspires me as your shepherd. As we begin our 71st year, we ask God to bless our parish and to help us live up to our Mission Statement to be a welcoming and teaching community.

## Social Action

### Children’s Social Action Activities

An important component of our Religious Education Program involves teaching our children the importance of helping others less fortunate. During the past year, our students participated in various service projects which included: donating money to **Operation Rice Bowl**; hosting bake sales to support various charitable organizations such as **Lifting Up Westchester** by filling Easter/Spring baskets with goodies for the homeless children, **St. Bartholomew’s Soup Kitchen** by decorating bags and filling them with socks and undergarments for the homeless, and **Westchester County Department of Corrections** in Valhalla by purchasing softbound Spanish and English Bibles for inmates; collecting unwanted Halloween candy and preparing and delivering brown bag lunches to the homeless at **HOPE Community Center**; purchasing snacks, gift cards and activity items for baskets to be delivered to “adopted” residences at **The New York Foundling**; participating in the parish’s **Adopt-a-Family Christmas outreach** for new mothers and their babies at **Good Counsel Homes**; packing **Angel Tree** gifts for delivery to various organizations; commencing a jeans donation drive for the needy; donating snacks, toiletries and sundries and preparing cards for our deployed military as part of **Operation Cupid – United for Troops**; providing candy and stuffing the eggs with candy for our Parish’s annual **Easter Egg hunt**; coloring thank you cards, assembling baskets filled with candy and delivering them to our **local police**; and donating food to our **Lenten Food Drive**.





## Social Action (continued)

### Youth Ministry Social Action

The St. Pius X Youth Ministry for high school students, grades 9-12, endeavors to help them grow in their faith and spiritual lives by providing an array of group community service projects. During the year, our teens sorted clothing for the **Sharing Shelf's Teen Boutique** and our parish's **Baby Shower Drive**; helped with set-up for our parish's **Trunk or Treat** and **Light Up the Night** events; helped to pack cars for our **Thanksgiving Food Drive**; made spring planters with residents of **The New York Foundling**; prepared, delivered and served meals at **HOPE Community Center**; and participated in the Interfaith Project, **Martin Luther King Day of Service JCCMW Blizzard Box Packing**, by packing non-perishable meals, called blizzard boxes, for food insecure community members. Our youth also created Halloween and Valentine's Day themed crafts for patients at **Blythedale Children's Hospital** and participated in a St. Patrick's Day activity with adults at **The New York Foundling**.

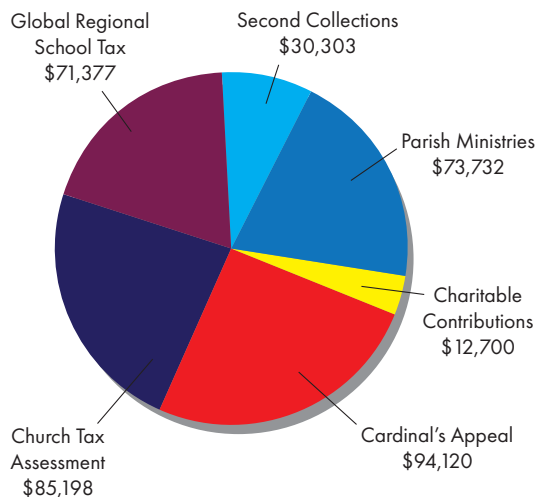
### Adult/Family Social Action

This past year, our adult parishioners engaged in numerous social action activities including, among others, donating to various charitable organizations such as the **Emergency Fund for the War in Israel**, **Missionary Church in the Philippines** and **Pontifical Good Friday for the Holy Land**; delivering 395 turkeys with the fixings to the hungry during our **Thanksgiving Food Drive**; providing food to persons less fortunate through programs such as **St. Peter's/St. Denis' Food Pantry** and our **Lenten Food Drive**; holding our semi-annual **Blood Drive**; collecting coats for our annual **Coat Drive** for parishes in Port Chester; collecting items for babies and pregnant moms through our **Baby Shower Drive** for **Good Counsel Homes** and the **Sharing Shelf**; purchasing, wrapping and delivering Christmas gifts to needy persons at the **Holy Spirit Church**, **Don Bosco Church**, **Sisters of Life**, **Good Counsel Homes** and **St. Patrick's Nursing Home** through programs such as **Adopt-a-Family**, the **Christmas Angel Giving Tree** and the **St. Patrick's Nursing Home Christmas Wish List**; supplying computer tablets, traditional school supplies and backpacks for local children at **My Sister's Place**, the **Sharing Shelf** and the **Holy Spirit Church** under our **Bag 2 School Program**; assisting with the cost of educating seminarians of the **Religious Community of the Alagad ni Maria** (Disciples of Mary); and knitting and crocheting items to donate to **Good Counsel Homes**, **Operation Gratitude** (an organization that supports our military, veterans and first responders), the **Linus Project** (an organization that supports needy children) and the **Sharing Shelf** through our **Thread for Life** ministry.

# Liturgical Services

## Liturgical Services for Children

Each month throughout the school year, one of the 10:30 am Family Masses was designated a **Ministry Mass** for a specified grade in our Religious Education Program. At these Masses, our students were active participants in the Mass as greeters, readers and presenters of the Gifts. We held our **Annual Backpack Blessing** at a Family Mass to remind our children that Christianity is a way of life that moves into all aspects of their lives and that God is with us always. Our second graders received their **Gold Books** at a **Mass of Blessing** in preparation for their First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion and attended a **Family Sacrament Day**. Our eighth grade Confirmation candidates came together at their **Inscription Service** to commit to do what was necessary to become Christian adults and attended a **Family Sacrament Day** and a **Spirit Mass**. Our first through fourth grade religious education students practiced for our annual **Christmas pageant** and presented the pageant to the parish one Sunday after the Family Mass. During Lent, our students participated in a devotion to the **Stations of the Cross** and processed to the altar on Palm Sunday. Our children participated in a **Multicultural Mass with a Parade of Nations** on Pentecost Sunday. In May, our children were invited to bring a **flower offering** to the statue of Mary and to crown Mary. Under the direction of James Walton, our parish formed a **Children’s Choir** for students in kindergarten through eighth grade to sing at select Sunday Family Masses. Our students were given the opportunity to go to confession during Advent and Lent.

### Liturgical Services for Youth and Adults

Liturgical services this past year included: monthly **Birthday Blessings**; **Blessing of the Parish Council Mass**; **Catechetical Sunday** to commission our religious education catechists; **Blessing of the Animals** to celebrate the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi; **Grandparent's Day blessing**; **widows and widowers monthly Masses**; **Wedding Jubilee Mass** where couples renewed their marriage vows; **Parade of Nations** at our multicultural Mass on Pentecost Sunday with parishioners reading a Prayer of the Faithful in their own native tongue; **Virgin of Guadalupe Mass** with a procession carrying a portrait of the Virgin, roses and candles; **St. Phoebe's Mass** in honor and celebration of women in ministry; **blessing of expectant mothers and newborns**; semi-annual **Communal Anointing of the Sick Mass**; **rosary devotions**; **Mary's Birthday** celebration; **Mary Under the Stars** celebration; **Blessing of the Angel Tree**, **Lighting the Advent Wreath**; **Building the Manger**; outdoor **Christmas Tree lighting** celebration with caroling; **Light Up the Night** prayer service with Fr. Gabriel; **Stations of the Cross** devotions; and **Triduum Rituals** including **washing of the feet**, **Tenebrae** and **Waters of Baptism**. Our Festival Choir under the direction of our Cantor, David Schmidt, performed during Christmas liturgies and Holy Week and a brass quartet played on Easter Sunday.

## The Sacraments

Our parish welcomed 33 new members, 1 adult and 32 infants into our community through Baptism in the past year. We prepared 8 couples for the Sacrament of Matrimony and united them in marriage.

In May, 45 second graders in our Religious Education Program made their First Reconciliation and received their First Holy Communion and 28 teens received the Gifts of the Holy Spirit and their commissioning as adults in our church at a Confirmation Liturgy with Bishop Dennis Sullivan. As part of their preparation to receive Confirmation, our eighth graders also attended a retreat at The Center at Mariandale. One adult was baptized, received his First Holy Communion and was confirmed on Holy Saturday.

## Scripture Study

This past year, our Adult Faith Formation Program explored the Sunday Gospels of St. Thomas Aquinas for an hour on Thursday evenings under the direction of Charles Junjulas, via Zoom.

## Speaker Series

In September, parishioners gathered to listen to Fr. James Martin, SJ speak about “Building Bridges: Reaching Out to LGBTQ+ Catholics.” In January, the parish presented the Eucharistic Miracle of the World Exhibition, which showcased the work of Carlo Acutis who cataloged every reported Eucharistic miracle prior to his death, along with a video on Acutis’ life presented by Augustin Lago and a talk by Sabrina Ferrisi, a reporter with the National Catholic Register who researched Acutis’ life.

## Retreats

In September, our parish hosted a Women’s Retreat, “Fall in Love with Jesus,” for women to step away from their daily routines and engage in self-reflection, spiritual renewal and collective worship. In February, some female parishioners attended a retreat at the Capuchin Family Ministries on “Women of Waters – Healing and Hope.” In addition, in February, some male parishioners attended a retreat at the Don Bosco Retreat Center on Faith and Courage in a Troubled World and some attended a Eucharistic Retreat at the Capuchin Family Ministries to reflect on the truth of Christ’s real presence in the Blessed Sacrament.

## Children's/Family Activities

Our parish strives to include children in our parish family by organizing fun events for them. This year, activities with our children included: our annual **Family Picnic** with pizza, burgers, ice cream, face painting and a bounce house; **Brunch with Santa**; **Trunk or Treat**; **Easter Egg Hunt**; our annual **First Communion family reception**; our weekly **Family Hospitality Table** after the Sunday Family Masses; our first annual **Lunar Festival** celebrated in Asian cultures in recognition of the first new moon of the lunar calendar that included a farewell reception for Fr. Raymond; and our multi-cultural **Pentecost potluck luncheon**.

As part of our **Concerts @ SPX**, our parishioners, their friends and community members enjoyed an **Afternoon of String Quartets** with Juilliard trained musicians; a **Lenten Reflection Organ Recital** with Rapheal Vogle of Juilliard; an **Eastertide Organ Recital** with Dr. Jennifer Pascual, the director of music and organist at St. Patrick's Cathedral; and a **Schubert Mass in G** to celebrate the beauty of the Eucharist with the St. Pius X Festival Choir, professional soloists and a professional orchestra.

## Adult Activities

Our parish welcomes all adult parishioners to participate in activities. This past year, adults enjoyed **Musical Chair Yoga**; **Zumba**; our annual **Christmas and St. Patrick's Day luncheons**; **dinner and an afternoon tea recognizing our Religious Education Teachers, Assistants and Hall Monitors**; our annual **Volunteers and New Parishioner Reception**; a hands on **flower arranging workshop**; monthly Masses followed by **social gatherings for our widows and widowers** and a **Seasons of Hope series** for those mourning.









# A Letter from the Finance Committee

---

November 2024

Dear Parishioners,

The following page contains detailed information regarding our parish income and expenses for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2024.

Our Total Regular Receipts were \$1,164,697, compared to \$1,081,196 last year, an increase of 7.8%.

Our Total Ordinary Expenses were \$1,290,600, compared to \$1,240,812 last year, an increase of 4.1%.

Our Total Revenue (consisting of Regular Receipts, Extraordinary Income and Capital Campaign Revenue) was \$1,422,230. Our Total Expenses (Ordinary Expenses, Extraordinary Expenses and Capital Expenses) was \$1,472,145. The deficit of \$49,915 was funded by our reserves.

Our Total Expenses (\$1,472,145) exceeded our Total Regular Receipts (\$1,164,697) by \$307,448.00. The deficit was funded by our Extraordinary Income (\$57,675), Capital Campaign Revenue (\$199,858) and our reserves (\$49,915).

We invite you to read our Comparative Statement of Income & Expenses for Fiscal Years ending August 31, 2024 and 2023 for a breakdown of our Regular Receipts and other revenue and our ordinary and extraordinary expenses.

Based on the budget we submitted to the Archdiocese, we are projecting that our Total Expenses will exceed our Regular Receipts by \$164,148 for the fiscal year ending August 31, 2025, notwithstanding budgeted increases in offertory collections. Over the last several years, in the absence of rental income from our school building, we have used one-time donations and bequests and collections of pledges from our capital campaigns to fund our expenses, however, this year, it was necessary to fund a portion of the deficit from the parish's reserves. In the absence of rental income or other revenue sufficient to cover any deficit, we will need to seek increased annual collections to avoid utilizing the parish's reserves on an ongoing basis.
